How the NRA shapes youth's long-term viewpoints on gun rights at summer camps

Introduction


- 11 million children & adults attending 8,400 overnight camps/year
- Riflery activity: NRA targets & training
- 80% camps increasing enrollment in 2016







Background









Theory

- Riflery → influences children's long-term viewpoints on guns, depending on familial background
- Family influence essential in deciding saliency of riflery experience (Lyons)
 - Child from gun-owning/supporting home : + likely support gun rights
 - Child from no gun/gun control home: -likely support gun rights
- Child unable to connect NRA with original gun stance b/c subtle influence

Research Design

- Need new study
- Not shooting camps
- ½ campers participate in riflery every day : survey 5, 10 & 25 yrs later
- Demographics: ages 9-16, high income, mostly white









Survey Questions

1. On Gun History:

- a. Did you grow up in a gun-owning household?
- b. Have you been in a gun's presence prior to attending camp?

2. On Current Gun Viewpoint:

- a. How important is it to you that people can own guns?
- b. Do you feel safer in an environment with guns?

3. On Camp Gun Experience:

- a. On a scale of 1 to 5, with 5 being the most, how much does your riflery experience at camp impact your stance on guns?
- b. On a scale of 1 to 10, with 10 being the most, how upset would you feel if camp took away riflery and trap shooting next summer?

4. On Connection to the NRA:

- a. Do you support the NRA's mission and programs?
- b. Would you ever consider buying an NRA membership (either adult of junior)?



Main Hypotheses

- **H1:** Campers in experimental group +pro-gun rights
 - Shapiro et al.= +gun exposure= +pro-gun rights
- **H2:** Campers in experimental group AND gun owning households= much more pro-gun rights in long-term
 - Vice-versa: children in control group & no gun households: much less likely to have riflery impact their long-term viewpoints
- **H3:** Campers in experimental group will be more pro-gun rights 5 years after camp experience than 25 years later
- **H4:** Female campers in experimental group less likely to be pro-gun rights
- **H5:** Campers in experimental group less likely to connect NRA to viewpoint
- **H6:** White campers will be + likely to support gun rights in experimental group

Potential Implications

- Camps = feeders into NRA ideology
 - But dependent on family, experiences outside of the home, race, and gender
- NRA hidden tactics= beneficial, especially with controversy
- Future studies: public camps, more diverse samples, different geographic areas
