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Featured Funder: The American Council of Learned Societies (ACLS)

The American Council of Learned Societies is no newbie to our monthly newsletter. With our last feature of ACLS in [2021](#), we highlighted big changes that were taking the grantmaking and academic landscape by surprise. As you know, we regularly share relevant funding opportunities with our faculty. ACLS has surfaced as relevant for quite a few of our most recent grant opportunity notifications to individual faculty members and we thought it would be helpful to share a broader range of opportunities at ACLS to a broader range of faculty.

ACLS' commitment to advancing knowledge and fostering intellectual exchange is evident in their diverse funding programs. With eligibility standards that make space for postdoctoral researchers to tenured faculty, and funding programs that highlight the value of historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) to community colleges, ACLS offers opportunities that welcome the depth of the humanities and interpretive social sciences. This month, we've highlighted some of the most relevant opportunities that may be worth adding to your grants calendar and consideration.

- ⇒ [ACLS Fellowships](#): This fellowship's tenure is for six to twelve months devoted to full-time research and/or writing. "The fellowship is open to scholars at all postdoctoral career stages, working on or off the tenure track, who have earned a PhD in the humanities or interpretive social sciences by the application deadline." "ACLS welcomes applications from scholars pursuing research on topics grounded in any time period, world region, or humanistic methodology. ACLS aims to select fellows who are broadly representative of the variety of humanistic scholarship across all fields of study." **Funding:** \$60,000; **Deadline:** *Anticipated September 2025*
- ⇒ [ACLS Digital Justice Seed Grants](#): Supports seed projects that critically engage with marginalized communities, explore new digital methods, and cultivate openness in knowledge production, while also building capacity through training, public engagement, and interdisciplinary collaborations. **Funding:** \$10,000- \$25,000; **Deadline:** *December 3, 2024*
- ⇒ [ACLS Digital Justice Development Grants](#): Supports existing projects that critically engage with marginalized communities, explore new digital methods, and cultivate openness in knowledge production, while also building capacity through training, public engagement, and interdisciplinary collaborations. **Funding:** \$50,000 and \$100,000; **Deadline:** *December 3, 2024*
- ⇒ [Leading Edge Fellowships](#): "Leading Edge Fellowships place recent humanities PhDs with nonprofit organizations committed to promoting social justice in their communities." **Funding:** \$70,000 in year one, and \$72,000 in year two; **Deadline:** *Anticipated March 2024*
- ⇒ [Potential Host Organizations for Leading Edge Fellowships](#): The ACLS Leading Edge Fellowship annually seeks host organizations to host fellows. Host organizations "benefit from fellows' scholarly training and broad sets of skills and capacities, including strong writing, project management, cultural competencies, and problem-solving skills." This is a great opportunity to work with a recent graduate and postbacs. **Funding:** host organizations must provide health insurance and other applicable benefits; **Deadline:** *LOIs typically due in September*
- ⇒ [Summer Institute for the Study of East Central and Southeastern Europe](#): "In partnership with the Centre for Advanced Study Sofia (CAS), ACLS enables scholars to undertake research, writing, and local fieldwork in Bulgaria and engage in interdisciplinary discussions during the Summer Institute for the Study of East Central and Southeastern Europe (SISECSE)." **Funding:** The program covers travel, accommodation, and per diem expenses; **Deadline:** *Anticipated September 2025*

National Science Foundation (NSF)	Proposers are encouraged to indicate in the project description the extent to which, if any, generative AI technology was used and how it was used to develop their proposal.	NSF reviewers are prohibited from uploading any content from proposals, review information and related records to non-approved generative AI tools. Policy is here .
National Institutes of Health (NIH)	Use at your own risk! "Using AI tools may introduce several concerns related to research misconduct, like including plagiarized text from someone else's work or fabricated citations. If we identify plagiarized, falsified, or fabricated information in a grant write-up, we will take appropriate actions to address the non-compliance." More here .	The NIH prohibits NIH scientific peer reviewers from using natural language processors, large language models, or other generative Artificial Intelligence (AI) technologies for analyzing and formulating peer review critiques for grant applications and R&D contract proposals. Policy is here .
National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH)	NEH will permit applicants to use AI technology to prepare their applications; however, NEH will require all applicants to specifically acknowledge (by use of footnotes or other marginal notations) when they have inserted AI-generated text into their proposals.	Because applications to NEH routinely contain confidential information and proprietary information, NEH's peer review process is and must remain strictly confidential. Accordingly, NEH prohibits peer reviewers from uploading NEH applications into a cloud database, which being owned and operated by third parties outside of the peer review process cannot guarantee the content's confidentiality. Policy is here .

History of Philanthropy: The Unexpected Origins of Charitable Deductions

It has been a busy few weeks in the grants office, so apologies for skipping an issue. In our last column, we began the story of the income tax as part of the first in a series of columns about philanthropy and the tax code. WWI is really where the charitable income tax began. The initial income tax had been relatively modest, but climbed to 67% on high earners to finance the war. The charitable deduction originated from the fear that the wealthy would no longer contribute to charity if their income taxes remained high and allowed people to deduct up to 15% of their charitable contributions from their tax bill. And that would be the whole story of the first charitable deduction, if it weren't for an odd little squiggle in the history of tax law, known as "the Philadelphia nun deduction."

The Philadelphia nun in question was Katharine Drexel, a wealthy heiress. Her grandfather, [Francis Martin Drexel](#) (1792-1863), had been born in present-day Austria, near the Swiss border and spent his early years working as a painter. He might have settled into a successful career of society portraits, if Napoleon hadn't blazed through Europe, conscripting troops as he went. Francis Drexel had no interest in becoming cannon fodder, much less fighting against his own home city, and ducked across the border to Switzerland. Drexel kept dodging conscription for the next five years, wandering through Switzerland, France, and Italy, before in 1817 heading to Philadelphia, where he set up shop as a painter and teacher. Business went well, for a while, until his brother-in-law started spreading rumors about him so slanderous that he was forced to sue. The rumors have been long forgotten, unfortunately for us historical gossip mongers, and the lawsuit was eventually settled out of court, but either the impact of the rumors on his business or his disenchantment with the whole affair prompted Francis to take up travelling again, this time to Chile and Peru. While there, Drexel painted several key figures in South American independence, including [Simon Bolivar](#).

When he eventually wound his way back to the U.S., Francis Martin set up shop working in finance, founding the firm Drexel & Co. Katharine's father, Francis Anthony Drexel, was the oldest son and senior partner of the family firm after his father's death, but preferred for his younger brother, Anthony, to take the lead. During the years that the brothers ran the firm, they [made a fortune](#) financing the Mexican-American War, the California Gold Rush, the Union army in the American Civil War, and the Industrial Revolution more broadly. Eventually, Anthony Drexel took on J.P. Morgan as a partner, providing the seeds of the firm that would eventually become J.P. Morgan Chase.

Katharine was born in 1858, the second of two daughters in a Catholic household. Her mother died five weeks after her birth, likely from childbirth complications. Her father soon remarried to Emma Bouvier, daughter of a French cabinet maker and later great-aunt to Jacqueline Bouvier Kennedy. The Drexel home was renowned for its charity, giving away \$30,000 a year to local causes, including paying the rent for 150 families. Katharine participated enthusiastically in the family charitable activities, giving out food, clothing, and, eventually in 1889 joining the convent of the Sisters of Mercy.

She spent most of her life and her prodigious fortune supporting Black and indigenous communities in the United States, including founding [Xavier University](#), the first Black Catholic university in the United States. In the aftermath of the Spanish-American War, [she funded the care of Afro-Cuban orphans](#), who were left without support as other philanthropists had little interest in supporting children of color.

Katharine Drexel spent so much of her fortune on charitable causes that when her income taxes shot up after WWI, she was suddenly at risk of no longer being able to meet her obligations. With the help of her well-connected family, she lobbied for the "Philadelphia nun exemption" that waived all income taxes for anyone who gave away an average of 90% of their income over ten years.
