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Featured Funder: Institute of Imagination and Ideas at Columbia (I3C)

[The Institute of Imagination and Ideas at Columbia University \(I3C\)](#) is a unique hub for interdisciplinary research and aims to foster “intellectual and creative diversity unconstrained by medium and discipline through the interaction of the arts and academia.” Housed at Reid Hall in Paris, I3C is a “presidential initiative that grew out of an extended process of faculty consultation and aims to encourage connections between the analytic and the creative, between ideas and imagination.” Each year, the Institute hosts a year-long program for a cohort of fourteen Fellows to work and be in conversation together. While half of the cohort is typically Columbia faculty and postdoctoral scholars (including Barnard College and Teachers College), each cohort also includes a selection of artists and writers from the global community.

Columbia, Barnard, and Teachers College faculty and researchers have the opportunity to apply for fellowships at the Institute. Faculty Visitorship Program at Reid Hall, jointly supported by Columbia Global Centers | Paris and the Institute for Ideas and Imagination. Fellows receive a stipend of \$75,000 for a full academic year (September-May) at Reid Hall in Paris. They are also provided with a dedicated office at the Institute, access to administrative and research support, and full privileges at Columbia's libraries and research facilities in Paris and across Europe. Eligible projects may involve collaborations with other Institute Fellows or colleagues in Paris, and include opportunities for research, workshop organization, and hosting talks or conferences. Fellows are expected to contribute to the Institute's podcast/video series and participate in at least one public lecture or panel discussion. If you are interested in applying, more information about the 2026-27 Fellowship cycle will be available in the summer of 2025.

In addition to their fellowship program and “in partnership with Columbia Global Centers | Paris, the Institute for Ideas and Imagination offers short term visitorships.” Faculty Visitors may pursue a diverse range of projects, including collaborative research with other Institute Fellows or Parisian colleagues, independent research endeavors, and the organization of workshops, talks, or conferences. Active participation within the Institute community is encouraged, such as contributing to our podcast/video series or participating in public lectures or panel discussions. Funding for the Fellowship includes round-trip airfare from New York to Paris (capped at \$1,500), coverage for housing costs, access to administrative support and dedicated office space at Reid Hall, and allocations for travel within France and Europe, as well as research and programming expenses. More information on the 2025-26 visitorship will be available in Spring 2025.

Sage Advice: A New Tool for NSF COA Reporting

While it seems like much of our community is last-minute gift shopping, IFSR learned of a new tool that just may be a game-changer and timesaver all *wrapped* into one. This past month, a tool to assist applicants complete the National Science Foundation’s (NSF) required Collaborators and Other Affiliations (COA) form was launched. The COA collects information about a researcher’s collaborators and professional affiliations, which allows the NSF to identify potential conflicts of interest during the application’s review process. Applicants must include a COA form for each individual identified as senior project personnel on the proposed project (see NSF Proposal and Award Policies and Procedures Guide (PAPPG), Chapter II.D.2.h(iii)). While submitting COA information is essential for promoting transparency, accountability, and ethical conduct in NSF-funded research, it can also be a “laborious” process, as creator of the new COA tool, [Jordan Matelsky](#), aptly points out.

How does it work? By simply entering your name or ORCID and specifying a timeframe, the tool quickly identifies all your publications within that period and provides a list of co-authors with their affiliations. Pairing the tool with NSF’s [COA template](#) significantly reduces the time and effort required to disclose the COA information, allowing researchers more energy to focus on what matters most—their research.

History of Philanthropy: The Blurred Lines Between Education and Propaganda

How do you tell the difference between education and propaganda? That's the question at the center of this month's column. From the very beginning of tax law, donations to educational institutions were considered exempt, but in the aftermath of WWI, the U.S. government found itself struggling to define education. Universities and colleges were never the issue; everyone agreed that they were exempt. The stickier question was whether advocacy groups counted as educational organizations. After all, someone handing out flyers about the dangers of alcohol as part of the temperance movement was, by their lights, educating the public by providing a certain set of facts. Should they be exempt from taxes in the same way a university is? The question was made particularly complicated by the fact that Congress did not pass any prohibitions against lobbying by charitable organizations until 1930, so there was no bright line between education for the sake of education and education for the sake of advancing a policy.

In an effort to settle the question, the Treasury Department released [Regulation 45, Article 517 in 1919](#):

Educational corporations may include an association whose sole purpose is the instruction of the public But associations formed to disseminate controversial or partisan propaganda are not educational within the meaning of the statute.

A year later, the Solicitor of Internal Revenue expanded on that definition, writing, "The prime purpose of education is to benefit the individual Propaganda[...] is disseminated not primarily to benefit the individual at whom it is directed, but accomplish the purpose or purposes of the person instigating it."

You can imagine how helpful that guidance was. There were various efforts to determine whether an idea counted as "controversial" or benefited the person propounding it. One of the most influential cases on that point occurred in 1930. [Slee vs. the Commissioner of Internal Revenue](#). Slee (no further name given) had donated for a number of years to the American Birth Control League and deducted the contributions from his taxes. The Internal Revenue Commissioner had rejected Slee's efforts to claim the charitable deduction, arguing that the American Birth Control League (ABCL) could not be considered a tax-exempt organization, due to its political activities.

The ABCL had been founded in 1921 by Margaret Sanger and there was no doubt that it was engaged in political activities. In the appendix to the 1921 book, [The Pivot of Civilization](#), Sanger laid out an activist program, rooted in the eugenicist belief that "Everywhere we see poverty and large families going hand in hand. Those least fit to carry on the race are increasing most rapidly." The ABCL outlined a list of aims, including research, education of the general public on the harms of unchecked procreation, clinical advice to married mothers about how to control pregnancy, "sterilization of the insane and feebleminded," and what we would consider lobbying, "To enlist the support and cooperation of legal advisers, statesmen and legislators in effecting the removal of state and federal statutes which encourage dysgenic breeding, increase the sum total of disease, misery and poverty and prevent the establishment of a policy of national health and strength."

Slee's case worked its way through various appeal systems, with the Board of Tax Appeals upholding the initial decision on the grounds that the ABCL promulgated "controversial propaganda." Upon further appeal, the Second Circuit also upheld the ruling, but not on the grounds of propaganda or even on the grounds that it was political activity. It would be unreasonable, the ruling argued, to prohibit charitable organizations from all efforts to change the law. After all, "A society to prevent cruelty to children, or animals, needs the positive support of law to accomplish its ends." Therefore, lobbying, per se, wasn't a problem; it was the scope of lobbying the ABCL engaged in, which extended far beyond the immediate aim of providing birth control at its clinics and aimed at transforming all of society. The ruling was a fragile compromise that allowed charitable organizations to pursue limited political action to advance their immediate ends. It was also a temporary solution. Only four years later, the legislature would take up the relationship between lobbying and charities in the new tax code. More on that after the break!
