## Sage Advice: Preparing Supplementary Materials for Government Grants

When applying for a grant, supplementary materials – biosketches, current and pending support, data management plans, etc. – can easily seem like an afterthought and be left to the last minute. But supplementary materials are just that—supplementary, and they help make your proposal whole. When paired with your proposal narrative, supplementary materials both complete and enhance your application in ways that can demonstrate your project’s eligibility, viability, and potential impact. While they may present as an organizational challenge, or even as red tape, supplementary materials are an opportunity to provide additional context and evidence to support your main proposal and can further help differentiate your application from others. We’ve put together our top four tips when preparing supplemental materials for a government grant application:

1. **Begin working on supplementary materials as soon as possible.** Starting the grant application by focusing on the supplementary materials allows you not only to have peace of mind that they are sound and complete, but to reserve the rest of your time and energy leading up to a deadline for focusing on your main proposal narrative. Starting on supplementary materials early on can allow for ample time for review, feedback, and revisions, not to mention technical challenges posed by online portals. While you may assume most of the responsibility preparing your main proposal narrative, preparing supplementary materials can sometimes be a collaborative process. Starting early gives everyone involved sufficient time to ask questions, gather necessary data, and facilitate required signatures of campus personnel.
2. **Develop a system to manage all required supplementary materials.** We always suggest breaking down the process into smaller and more manageable tasks, such as gathering information, drafting documents, obtaining signatures, and finalizing submissions. Using a spreadsheet or checklist system can also help you decrease the amount of time you spend re-learning what is required of a specific document or form before submission. Many of the supplementary materials can be very specific to the funder and require research on what completing the form will entail. Having a system on hand early on that includes a brief summary of the form’s purpose, the specific information or signatures needed, and even lingering questions about the document will help ensure no materials or components of completing a form gets overlooked. We also suggest including a timeline as a part of this organizational system, which will be more likely to stay organized and on track for potential deadlines that lead up to the large grant submission. This timeline will serve as a roadmap to guide your progress and prevent last-minute rushes, as well as help prepare you for road bumps that may be out of your control.
3. **Attend the grant-specific webinars.** Calls for proposals that expect a high number of applicants often host webinars to streamline information and support prospective grantees throughout the grant application process. These webinars often give a glimpse of the the submission database, review supplementary materials, and host Q+A sessions where you can ask about the supplementary requirements and more. We also encourage you to reach out to the Program Officer if you have further questions.
4. **Reach out to IFSR!** The good news is that our office can support and assist with the majority of the tips and resources suggested for gathering, organizing, and managing supplementary materials. We can offer guidance on how to reach out to a program officer, create a comprehensive dashboard outlining all grant requirements, provide sample or template documents, coordinate necessary signatures, navigate the submission database, prioritize attending webinars when we know you have interest in applying to a specific opportunity, and even do the final steps of submitting the grant to verify all required components are uploaded and complete. By reaching out to our office early, you can save time and effort and have peace of mind that all supplementary materials meet the rfp requirements.

## History of Philanthropy: Income Tax

We're back after a brief pause in August! For the last few issues, we have been discussing the various Gilded Age fortunes and their legacies—the Rockefeller Foundation, the Russell Sage Foundation, and the Carnegie Foundation, most prominently. You might have found yourself wondering why I haven't spent more time discussing the tax implications of those gifts. Here's the answer: there weren't really any. The whole world of charitable contributions that we know today, with deductions and specialized investment vehicles, all grew out of fluctuations in the income tax. The income tax only officially became public policy in 1913 with the passage of the Sixteenth Amendment, typically after tycoons like Andrew Carnegie and John D. Rockefeller began giving away their money.

So how, and why, did we end up with the income tax? For a long time, income tax wasn't on the table. The Constitution gave Congress the power to levy taxes, of course, but insisted that taxes needed to be uniform across state populations—that is, [“the same amount per person in every state,”](#) which is obviously no help at all if the goal is to collect varying amounts based on income. Mostly, the government scraped by with tariffs during its early years, at most flirting with the idea of an income tax during the War of 1812, but never really moving forward with it. Then came the Civil War. In 1862, Congress passed an [income tax](#), imposing a 3% tax for incomes between \$600 and \$10,000 and 5% tax for incomes above \$10,000. The tax was repealed ten years later in 1872, and it was back to tariffs.

But it was not back to tariffs without reservation. At the debate over whether to repeal the income tax in 1872, John Sherman, a Senator from Ohio and Chairman of the Finance Committee, [took to the floor of the Senate](#) and warned that if his colleagues repealed the income tax, they would “hear clamor coming from the mass of the people who will complain of injustice and wrong, and their voice, although not often heard in the way of petitions, when it comes to you is more mighty than the waves of the sea.”

Sherman proved to be prescient. There had always been tariffs, going back to the beginning of the United States, but the earliest tariffs passed by George Washington were a flat 5% on all imported goods. With each new war, tariff rates ticked higher and never settled back down. By the latter half of the 19th century, [tariffs rarely fell below 38%](#), and the poor were starting to grumble that they were the main ones paying taxes, as businesses handled the steep tariffs by raising the prices of the end product and passing them along to consumers. Just as importantly, tariffs were also seen as an active subsidy for the rich. Wealthy moguls, the argument ran, had the power to push tariffs through Congress that favored their businesses, while smaller businesses lacked the connections to do the same. The moguls, in turn, liked to point out that tariffs protected jobs in industries that might not otherwise exist.

Labor leaders, farmers, and laypeople began to organize. One self-taught farmer's wife, Merlinda Sissins of Michigan, wrote a series of letters to *The Journal of United Labor*. [In the first, she wrote](#), “The great issues ov this hour tu be the rites of the farmers and laborers (for their interests are identical and the same), as ginst the hydra-headed monster that is suckin our life's blood—hi taxation and monopoly [sic]” Sissins later provided the text for a petition to her readers, demanding that a representative be chosen from the laboring class and pledging not to vote for anyone else. Sissins was representative of a growing radical strain among farmers, who faced poor returns on crops and high prices for imported goods. An income tax, they thought, would shift the burden from the poor consumers to the wealthy capitalists.

Progressive politicians responded by taking up the cause of the income tax, trying in 1894 to tack a 2% tax on incomes over \$4,000 onto a tariff bill. In a 5-4 ruling, the Supreme Court promptly struck it down as unconstitutional. In 1909, progressives tried again, attaching a provision for an income tax to another tariff bill. Conservatives countered, suggesting a constitutional amendment for an income tax, never seriously believing it would pass. One state legislature after another ratified it, and in 1913 the Sixteenth Amendment passed, granting Congress the right to levy an income tax. Next issue, we'll tackle how this led to the creation of a charitable deduction.
