Featured Funder: Templeton Foundation

The John Templeton Foundation was established in 1987 to "support interdisciplinary research and catalyze conversations that inspire awe and wonder." Named after its founder, who believed deeply in progress, learning, and the power of human imagination, the Foundation ultimately aims to "create a world where people are curious about the wonders of the universe, free to pursue lives of meaning and purpose, and motivated by great and selfless love." The Templeton Foundation uniquely bridges the worlds of science, philosophy, and religion, supporting work on subjects ranging from black holes and evolution to creativity, forgiveness, and free will. While most of its funding supports topics in science, philosophy, and religion, approximately 40% of its annual grants go to character development, genius, freedom, free enterprise, and fields associated with classical liberalism, reflecting the founder's belief in human potential and individual initiative.

The Templeton Foundation operates through a two-stage application process, beginning with an Online Funding Inquiry (OFI) that serves as the required first step. The Foundation welcomes OFI submissions at any point during the year but has a deadline for August 15, 2025 with a decision taking place by October 10, 2025. The Templeton Foundation also periodically runs funding competitions that operate under their own set of deadlines. While no funding competitions are currently open, the Templeton Foundation currently welcomes OFIs for the programs below, with grants for each program typically ranging between \$50,000-\$2 million:

- Character Virtue Development: "...seeks to better understand and elevate the cultivation of character, with a focus on moral, performance, civic, and intellectual virtues, such as humility, gratitude, curiosity, diligence, and honesty." The 2025 Funding Cycle has a particular interest in supporting "projects that highlight the role of relationships and communities in helping to address some of the most pressing issues individuals will face in the next decade."
- Individual Freedom & Free Markets: "...supports education, research, and outreach projects to promote individual freedom, free markets, free competition, and entrepreneurship. Grounded in the ideas of classical liberal political economy and with a commitment to the moral equality of all human beings, [the Foundation seeks and develops projects that aim to advance freedom and human flourishing for all persons. Whether by academic research, instruction, public outreach, or supporting debate on public policy, [the Foundation's] grants contribute toward making the world more just, more prosperous, and more peaceful."
- ⇒ Life Sciences: "...supports research and engagement projects on the fundamental structures of the biological world, from the origin of life to synthetic biology across all the biological kingdoms." The 2025 Funding Cycle has a particular interest in supporting "... research that advances the scientific understanding of fundamental characteristics of living systems, such as directionality, agency, memory, and adaptive navigation through complex problem spaces."
- ⇒ Mathematical & Physical Sciences: "...support research seeking to shed light on the fundamental concepts of physical reality. We also explore the interplay between these sciences and broader human experience."
- Public Engagement: "supports content projects that include video, audio, public events, and print media. In addition, [the Foundation] seeks proposals that support the next generation of thought leaders, generate durable courses and programming at leading universities, and highlight the role of virtues like intellectual humility, gratitude, curiosity, and love in solving society's most pressing problems."
- ⇒ Religion, Science, and Society: "Research supported by this funding area aims to expand and enhance the ways people experience meaning, understand the universe, and cultivate social connectedness. [The Foundation's] approach prioritizes interdisciplinary work that engages with the sciences and humanities on themes relevant to understanding how humans navigate spiritual and scientific questions in various contexts." The 2025 Funding cycle currently has a particular interest in "how religion, spirituality, and culture evolve across the world and transform human experience."

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History of Philanthropy: History of NIH (Part III)

We left off <u>last issue</u> with our ongoing story of the history of the NIH by looking at one of the early laws regulating biological agents, the Biologics Control Act of 1902. As detailed, Congress only passed the act after several disasters involving contaminated medication led to the death of over a dozen children. While the story is interesting in itself, it is also a revealing example of how much it took to nudge the American government toward passing laws around health, given the general cultural belief that the government had no business in supporting science. It would take even more to push the government into passing the next big piece of legislation for the NIH, the Ransdell Act of 1932.

The push came in part from the success of new scientific breakthroughs following the discovery of germ theory. The federal government began tracking causes of death on a national level in 1900 after establishing a death registration system. (Prior to that, tracking took place on a scattershot state level.) From 1900 to 1920, the rate of deaths caused by infectious diseases dropped by half, with a brief blip in 1918 from the Spanish Influenza pandemic. Several life-saving vaccines were also invented between 1900 and 1930, including those for diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, tuberculosis, and scarlet fever. The practical benefits of scientific investigation were on display for the broader public in a way seldom matched.

In that context of growing faith in the power of science came World War I. WWI is sometimes called "the chemist's war" because of the huge role that chemical weapons played. The most famous weapon, of course, was mustard gas, which the Germans deployed for the first time in 1917 at the Battle of Ypres, but there were predecessors, including chlorine gas, also invented by the Germans and used starting in 1915. All the major European countries started frantically investigating chemical weapons—how to make them, how to detect them, how to defend against them, and how to treat people wounded by them. Factories sprang up to manufacture gas and gas masks alike. The U.S. was no exception. As the U.S. was relatively late to enter the war, it did not launch <u>a formal chemical warfare research division until 1917</u>, but once it did, it rapidly began employing chemists.

The government employed plenty of other scientists, not just chemists. The secretary of the Smithsonian Institution, Charles Walcott, <u>convinced Congress to establish the National Advisory</u> <u>Committee for Aeronautics (NACA) in 1915</u> by arguing that the U.S. had fallen dangerously behind other nations in its research in aeronautics. NACA was later succeeded by NASA.

Much of the research NACA advised doing took place at the National Bureau of Standards, now called the National Institute of Standards and Technology. In addition to researching aeronautics, the National Bureau of Standards took up questions of submarine detection, gauges, optics, photography, waste elimination, gas warfare, standardization for mass production, and substitutes for materials to account for shortages. The National Bureau of Standards wasn't the obvious home for these research questions – it had been established in 1901 primarily to ensure uniform weights and measures in the U.S. – but it also had a laboratory and took up research because the military often lacked the facilities. The number of employees grew accordingly, <u>swelling from 517 at the start of the war to 1,117 in 1918</u>. The military also started offering exemptions to scientists in an effort to preserve its talent for research.

When the war ended, the idea of the government employing scientists no longer seemed so outlandish. The trick would be pushing the government to continue that support after the war.
