girlfriend,

also a Hong Konger,

00:04:40.445 --> 00:04:48.050
the government proposed an amendment bill that allows extradition to China.

It means like including Taiwan under the One China Policy.

The burning concerns over losing our judicial autonomy in Hong Kong and

00:05:00.140 --> 00:05:08.705 the government's unresponsiveness turned into continuous protests that last for months.

00:05:13.210 --> 00:05:16.865 Every month we have a peaceful rally.

00:05:16.865 --> 00:05:23.250 You see that I was in the middle of the protest.

00:05:26.040 --> 00:05:31.755 things escalate and violence escalate

00:05:39.090 --> 00:05:43.950 tear gas, or even water cannon deployed by

00:05:43.950 --> 00:05:50.655 the police and deployed indiscriminately.

Then in November, the campus of the university has been raided by the police.

This is the Hong Kong Polytechnic University.

The campus has been under siege for 13 days and more than 1,300 people were arrested.

00:06:38.730 --> 00:06:46.690 a benchmark to show people's voice against the government.

00:07:13.949 --> 00:07:20.580 she agreed to use this concept like a community curator.

00:07:30.860 --> 00:07:37.345 last year, and I've been helping her in her district work as well.

Her idea basically is to, I would say actually,

she tried to make good use of

public resources and people's expertise in the neighborhood using a
bottom-up approach.

This is what she calls a community curator.

I've been shadowing her work
00:08:08.040 --> 00:08:14.470
indeed as part of my ethnographic research in the past one year.

I contribute ideas,
00:08:16.380 --> 00:08:17.490
I discuss with her,
00:08:17.490 --> 00:08:23.685
sometimes I help her distributing some propensity things,
00:08:23.685 --> 00:08:27.820
do design, whatever she needs, I'll be there.
00:08:27.820 --> 00:08:35.070
At the same time, you know that year 2020 was a very difficult one.
00:08:35.070 --> 00:08:40.005
We have the pandemic and the protest was still going on.
00:08:40.005 --> 00:08:45.000
This is actually the health workers in public hospital.
00:08:45.000 --> 00:08:50.675
They have a strike to demand the government to close the China border
00:08:50.675 --> 00:08:57.820
so as to stop the spread of the virus to Hong Kong.

Also in February, this is
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00:09:02.550 --> 00:09:10.200

the very last public assembly with the so-called approval.

That means no objection matter from the police.
00:09:14.205 --> 00:09:20.595
This is the last assembly being approved by the police.
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00:09:20.595 --> 00:09:23.525 After that, all the assemblies or

00:09:23.525 --> 00:09:29.445 all public gatherings are illegal according to the government.

00:09:29.445 --> 00:09:31.545 Just like this day,

00:09:31.545 --> 00:09:36.960 we also have all these social distancing measures.

00:09:37.120 --> 00:09:41.985 Indeed, I would say in the name of public health,

00:09:41.985 --> 00:09:46.460 the government implemented all the social distancing policies to stop

00:09:46.460 --> 00:09:55.464 public gatherings instead of really doing containment or public health control.

Because it doesn't make sense why they asked people to stay,

This man invited all these residents to share the stories of their pets.

We have Wong Wing Tong who did a lot of community work in the past few years.

So Wong Wing Tong has actually taught people how to desert

the clothes and see they are doing the knitting here in another picture.

Actually, there's a space in this alley and do

00:14:25.120 --> 00:14:31.525

all this knitting and make some mat like the one you see in the poster.

The circle thing is like a tool he used to help people to do the knitting.

00:14:41.790 --> 00:14:48.720

I have added this video and put it up on her Facebook, you know, things like that.

Actually, there are some other artists

[NAME] and also [NAME] for this month.

Every month actually there's an artist to conduct community projects or

public activities in the community during

their one month residency in this small art space.

For the local residents,

they welcomed this a lot because for them it's great fun.

Also, as I say, they are very well off and also well educated.

They welcomed these activities and find it, oh yeah,

00:15:36.430 --> 00:15:40.525

that's great. At least during the lockdown,

they have something to do or they can really do something in

the community and meet people through this art space and through Clara.

I just want to make a quick reference here about

the changing role of Hong Kong's civil society,

that actually as observed by Elaine Chan and Joseph Chan in their research,

they say that Hong Kong civil society changed from being

00:16:11.590 --> 00:16:18.130

a passive defender to a more active protector,

00:16:18.130 --> 00:16:22.855

especially during the Umbrella Movement in 2014.

But little later on, because of all this disagreement among the protesters,

00:16:29.575 --> 00:16:33.775

and there was a loss of mutual trust,

00:16:33.775 --> 00:16:37.960

I will maybe add a remark here that after 2019,

I feel we gained our mutual trust.

But actually this has the shifting role of civil society.

Then I'm going to show you a few projects that have been

organized by a few groups that I set up with my friends in the past
few years.

Indeed, I consciously set up these few groups of friends
00:17:43.990 --> 00:17:50.710
and each group has a given mission and branding so-called for funding
purposes.

I did it consciously, indeed,

because I researched a lot on social practices and activism.

I know that actually my work is politically quite sensitive and

to avoid all this censorship and a possible censorship,

to say, that actually I set up
00:18:13.090 --> 00:18:17.320
these groups with friends so whenever we apply for funding,
00:18:17.320 --> 00:18:18.520
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we use the good names, 00:18:18.520 --> 00:18:20.815 but not my personal name. 00:18:20.815 --> 00:18:28.450 This helps me conceal my identity somehow as I 00:18:28.450 --> 00:18:36.770 also struggle a lot myself with the identity of the artist in social practices. 00:18:37.230 --> 00:18:44.500 Actually these few projects run by the groups that I set up with my friends. 00:18:44.500 --> 00:18:48.940 These projects indeed were curated not by me, 00:18:48.940 --> 00:18:51.670 but by my good partner, 00:18:51.670 --> 00:18:55.720 and also maybe we invite some independent curator or sometimes 00:18:55.720 --> 00:18:59.695 when independent curators came to us, we would say, "Oh yeah, 00:18:59.695 --> 00:19:04.405 maybe you can join us, 00:19:04.405 --> 00:19:08.920 use our group names to get the funding or things like that." 00:19:08.920 --> 00:19:11.140 There are three projects here. 00:19:11.140 --> 00:19:14.410 One is the Lion Rock and Mart, 00:19:14.410 --> 00:19:18.565 and the second one is this knitting one. 00:19:18.565 --> 00:19:22.420 Actually, is called Knitting and Up Cycle. 00:19:22.420 --> 00:19:24.415

The third one is really intricate,

00:19:24.415 --> 00:19:27.110

it's called Fun Fun Union. 00:19:31.890 --> 00:19:38.185 For Lion Rock and Mart, actually the original plan was to have a concert, 00:19:38.185 --> 00:19:44.965 one-day festival with concert, 00:19:44.965 --> 00:19:47.770 Indie band music, 00:19:47.770 --> 00:19:52.930 and then at the same time there will be a bazar. 00:19:52.930 --> 00:19:57.040 That is a very popular form in Hong Kong in the past, 00:19:57.040 --> 00:19:58.705 I will say past decade, 00:19:58.705 --> 00:20:01.660 that people would just sell 00:20:01.660 --> 00:20:08.140 their handmade things at a reasonable price. 00:20:08.140 --> 00:20:15.640 But then this is a district council funded projects so we cannot really sell things. 00:20:15.640 --> 00:20:19.840 The idea was actually people can exchange their things. 00:20:19.840 --> 00:20:21.940 For example, I'm good at making dress, 00:20:21.940 --> 00:20:25.390 so I will exchange. 00:20:25.390 --> 00:20:28.720 You can take my dress, well, 00:20:28.720 --> 00:20:33.220 actually you can maybe exchange it with something that you're good at making, 00:20:33.220 --> 00:20:35.995

say make a cake, something like that.

That's the original idea,
00:20:38.215 --> 00:20:40.510
but because of the pandemic,
00:20:40.510 --> 00:20:48.225
we have to postpone the activity from December to January this year.

Actually we have to put everything online,
00:20:50.925 --> 00:20:53.100
it's really really challenging,
00:20:53.100 --> 00:20:59.310
how can you do that bazar in a free market online?
00:20:59.310 --> 00:21:01.050
When my partner make it,
00:21:01.050 --> 00:21:04.370
I actually put it on Instagram,
00:21:04.370 --> 00:21:12.270
and she pre-taped a lot of groups that are joining this
00:21:12.270 --> 00:21:21.250
bazar and then at the same time there was the live band show,
00:21:21.250 --> 00:21:23.770
but actually there is no audience,
00:21:23.770 --> 00:21:28.870
so they did perform in front of the camera and then people can watch
it on Facebook.
00:21:28.870 --> 00:21:31.915
For the bazar you'll see actually on
00:21:31.915 --> 00:21:35.260
the right-hand side you will see like this guy is doing calligraphy.
00:21:35.260 --> 00:21:38.860
There are also dressmakers and some high-school students,
00:21:38.860 --> 00:21:41.140
for example, that actually they have
00:21:41.140 --> 00:21:45.235
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the video doing demonstration of their work, things like that.

For the music show, there are a few bands, Indie bands.

Even like the one on the right,

you'll see the two guys actually they're the district counselors of that district.

One thing actually, the Lion Rock is really a symbol of Hong Kong.

have something called like Lion Rock spirit or things like that.
